Kesgrave Annual Town Meeting

At the end of 2021, PCSO Ellie Miles, who was covering the Kesgrave area moved on to another role within Suffolk Police. A new PCSO for the area has been recruited, so we are now just waiting for them to begin in post.

It's fantastic to see the improvement work that has been done on the Kesgrave underpasses, and it makes such a difference to the appearance of the area. We do get some issues with criminal damage and graffiti in the Kesgrave area, so I would urge anyone who sees any damage being caused to report this to the police. It's often difficult for the police to catch people in the act with crimes such as this, so we need the community to help us by reporting any concerns.

Unfortunately, in recent weeks there seems to have been a spate of vehicle crime in Kesgrave. The most important advice in relation to this is to make sure that your vehicle is secure and that any valuable items are removed from the vehicle when you leave it. Thieves are usually opportunist, so don't make your vehicle an easy target. We would also recommend parking in well-lit places where possible. Should you see anything suspicious or unknown people around your vehicle please report it - this includes letting us know about any footage of suspicious behaviour that you might capture on CCTV or dashcams etc

There have also been a number of distraction thefts at supermarkets reported in Kesgrave and the wider East Suffolk area. We have tried to raise awareness of this issue, and we appreciate the help of local organisations who have spread the word, displayed posters and handed out some crime prevention items for us.

As an update for police engagement in the area, I've been working with Kesgrave Library to have monthly drop-in sessions where crime prevention information, bike security marking and general police advice are available. I've also been invited into various groups such as Forget-me-not café and the Kesgrave Help Centre coffee mornings, as well as visiting local schools and nurseries. Last summer we ran some bike security marking sessions at Oak Meadow, and as the weather improves I hope to arrange more sessions like this.
